Course # 231 Printmaking 2

Credit Hours: 3 Hrs

Scheduled hours per week 6 studio hours per week

Catalog Course Description:

Continuation of ART 230. Exploration, craftsmanship and personal expression in one of four print media

Pre-requisites: ART 230

Co-requisites: None

Course Learning Outcomes:

The student will demonstrate an increased familiarity with the history, techniques, tools, and vocabulary of printmaking.

The student will develop increased skill in three selected printmaking processes.

The student will be knowledgeable of the methods and materials used in the conservation, documentation and presentation of prints.

The student will execute prints that demonstrate knowledge and understanding of color theory and design principles as they apply to printmaking.

The student will demonstrate appropriate studio etiquette, safety, and care of presses, tools and equipment.

The student will attend local art exhibits and openings and will discuss and critique works viewed.

The student will develop skill in evaluating his/her own work and the work of others.

The student will demonstrate proper presentation of work for exhibition; including mounting or matting. The student will experience increased creative choice and be encouraged to develop a personal style through a body of work.

The student will design, process and print multiple editions, explain the methods used for the given process, and summarize the history of that process.

Topics to be studied:

Materials and equipment overview.

Contemporary Printmaking and art history.

Presentation of the print; presentation of the edition.

The conservation and documentation of prints.

Individual style / historical style

Relief, planography, stencil and intaglio. (select 3 for personal emphasis)

Applying care and knowledge gained from test plates.

Alternative printmaking surfaces.

Critique of work: one's own, others, work viewed in local exhibits.

Technical realization of one idea in multiple processes.
