Course # 360 Contemporary Art History

Credit Hours: 3 Hrs

Scheduled hours per week

Catalog Course Description:

This course explores the various artistic movements from 1945 to the present. Emphasis will be placed on critical theory, historical context, and familiarity with images and artists.

Co-requisites: None

Course Learning Outcomes:

- Students will understand the different movements in contemporary art history, and the distinct artists, historical context, techniques, and ideals which characterize each movement.
- Students will understand the chronological influence of contemporary art history and the connections between culture and history.
- Students will master the specialized vocabulary of art history and art making, and learn to use this language to evaluate and interpret works of art.
- Students will gain a broader understanding and appreciation of works of art in a variety of contexts by engaging in cultural events, museums, and galleries.
- Students will improve analytical, writing, and critical thinking skills through the process of examining, analyzing, and interpreting contemporary art.
- Students will be able to identify the techniques, media, and style in a work of art.
- Students will understand the advancements of technology and historic events that impact artists and culture
- Students will increase their aesthetic values and personal connections to art by expanding their knowledge and understanding of diverse perspectives.

Topics to be studied:

- The history of modern art from the origins of modern art to the present. The course will
 explore artists, philosophy and application through the study of major works of art,
 articles, essays, web galleries, and videos.
- The formal analysis of art including the elements of art and the principles of design.
- The formal vocabulary of art and how to evaluate and interpret works of art through visual and various formal analysis methods.
- Personal and social connections to art and its function and changing role in society.
- Online discussion boards will be used as a form of class discussion and an opportunity to reflect on what you have learned.
