MUSIC 241: Choral Conducting and Techniques

Credit Hours: 3

Scheduled hours per week: Lecture: 2 Lab/Rehearsal: 1 Other: 0

Catalog Course Description: Conducting and rehearsal techniques, conducting patterns, development of choral sound, singer's diction, selection of repertoire, analysis of musical score, and performance problems.

Pre-requisites: Permission of instructor based on musical training and experience (Music theory, piano, voice, choral singing experience are all recommended)

Co-requisites: None

Course Learning Outcomes: Choral Conducting provides a comprehensive introduction to the skills and knowledge essential for individuals who desire to conduct choral ensembles. In this course:

- 1. Students will learn conducting gestures and use them in rehearsal with singers
- 2. Students will develop analytical skills
- 3. Students will learn proper diction for English and Latin languages including the use of IPA
- 4. Students will develop an appropriate sequence of warm-ups and use them to begin a rehearsal
- 5. Students will select repertoire and develop a rehearsal plan
- 6. Students will learn skills for administering a choral music program

Topics to be studied:

- 1. Conducting patterns in simple, compound, and asymmetric meters
- 2. Fermatas, cues, dynamics, and expressive gestures
- 3. Analysis of a musical score
- 4. Selection of repertoire
- 5. Rehearsal techniques
- 6. Development of a choral sound
- 7. Vocal warm-ups
- 8. English and Latin diction

Special Requirements of the course:

- 1. Students will prepare a rehearsal plan, including vocal warm-ups, and execute the plan with a choral ensemble.
- 2. Students will work with an ensemble on choral fundamentals including choral tone, breathing, sight reading, and diction.
- 3. Students will work with a choral ensemble on repertoire appropriate to the type and level of the ensemble and, when possible, conduct a public performance
- 4. Students will evaluate repertoire for various types and levels of choirs and prepare a repertoire file.
- 5. Students will read selected books and articles on conducting and watch video tapes of master conductors
- 6. Students will attend rehearsals to observe other conductors
